42nd GLSA Great Lakes Benefit Salmon Derby--A Great Success

Seventy-nine fishermen on 20 fishing vessels, provided by Michigan City Charter Association at reduced rate for our hospital, launched the 42nd Annual Great Lakes Shrine Association Benefit Salmon Derby, May 19-21, out of Michigan City, IN, harbor (photo, left). Fishing at about 100-

feet depth in Lake Michigan, they enjoyed splendid catches of Coho and king salmon, steelheads, lake and brown trout, and chi-



nook (photo right). The average weight of each fish is10 lbs.; the best of this year's catch was a 19-lb. lake trout.

The first salmon derby was held in May 1975, under the leadership of Bob Drake, GLSA president, and Dr. Dan Bowers of Shriners International. The largest attendance for one year was 426 Nobles. More than 27 Shrine Temples have participated in the event, including 12 Imperial officers. Over the years this event has raised more than \$500,000 for our hospital.

2016 GLSA president, Murat Noble Phil Thrasher, attended the opening launch but did not fish this year. Organized and directed by Mizpah Shrine, Mizpah Nobles Sam Winebrenner, Larry Chapel, Owen Wade,

Dave Hollenbach, and Frank Nordman (in photo, right) presented this year's gift of \$4,000 to Yours Truly at a recent luncheon at the hospital.
