Springfield Seamstress Shares Needle-Craft with Children



In mid-summer, Noble John Blondell, President of the Ainad Shriners Hospital Unit (right in photo left, with Murat Noble Gordon Husk and Board Chairman Bill Kuehn), delivered more than 50 lap quilts to SHC – Chicago. The lap quilts, a donation to members of the Road Runners of Ainad Shriners, were created by Bettye Smith of Edwardsville, IL.

Bettye, known as the "Quilt Lady in the Metro East," has been quilting since she retired from Ralston Purina in September 2001. When she started quilting, Bettye delivered red, white, and blue quilts to men and women veterans in nursing homes. In addition, she donated her quilts to St. Jude Children's Research Hospital, the Special Olympics, and

Cardinal Glennon Children's Hospital, St. Louis.

On average it costs Bettye \$16,000 each year for the materials, and that does not include her time--which is priceless. Since she began quilting, she has delivered over 2,000 quilts to SHC. Bettye is not able to travel long distances since she is on oxygen 24/7. Over the years, she has enjoyed making quilts for the kids. According to Bettye, "My kids always come first and I enjoy what I do." Members of Ainad Shriners Hospital Unit and Road Runners are making her wish come true by delivering her lap quilts to the SHC - Chicago and SHC - Cincinnati this summer.
